We Ought Always to Pray

Luke 11:1-13; 18:1-8

I want to take two passages of Luke out of sequence in our study in order to encourage us at a crucial time in the history of our church. As you are aware, the expansion project of the roads around us and the intersection has brought us also to a crossroad. Our location, and our ministry therefrom, is significantly threatened. Yet, nothing takes God by surprise and He knows the plans He has for us, plans established from the beginning of creation, plans to bless His work among us, plans for a hope and a future. It is our great privilege at this time to seek His will and to discern His mind so that we might make the decisions that will insure we remain in the context of His purpose.

Luke 11:1 It happened that while Jesus was praying in a certain place, after He had finished, one of His disciples said to Him, "Lord, teach us to pray just as John also taught his disciples."

² And He said to them,
"When you pray, say:
'Father, hallowed be Your name. Your kingdom come.

³ 'Give us each day our daily bread.

⁴ 'And forgive us our sins, For we ourselves also forgive everyone who is indebted to us. And lead us not into temptation.'"

⁵ Then He said to them, "Suppose one of you has a friend, and goes to him at midnight and says to him, 'Friend, lend me three loaves:

⁶ for a friend of mine has come to me from a journey, and I have nothing to set before him';

⁷ and from inside he answers and says, 'Do not bother me; the door has already been shut and my children and I are in bed; I cannot get up and give you anything.'

⁸ "I tell you, even though he will not get up and give him *anything* because he is his friend, yet because of his persistence he will get up and give him as much as he needs.

⁹ "So I say to you, ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you.

Luke 18:1 Now He was telling them a parable to show that at all times they ought to pray and not to lose heart, ² saying, "In a certain city there was a judge who did not fear God and did not respect man.

³ "There was a widow in that city, and she kept coming to him, saying, 'Give me legal protection from my opponent.'

⁴ "For a while he was unwilling; but afterward he said to himself, 'Even though I do not fear God nor respect man,

⁵ yet because this widow bothers me, I will give her legal protection, otherwise by continually coming she will wear me out."

⁶ And the Lord said, "Hear what the unrighteous judge said;

⁷ now, will not God bring about justice for His elect who cry to Him day and night, and will He delay long over them?

⁷ "If you abide in Me, and My words abide in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be done for you.

⁸ "My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit, and so prove to be My disciples.

16 "You did not choose Me but I chose you, and appointed you that you would go and bear fruit, and *that* your fruit would remain, so that whatever you ask of the Father in My name He may give to you.
