The Letter From James: James is faith with feet; it is a letter of practical exhortation and an expression of what living out the Christian life is like. James demonstrates saving faith by action, so much so that Luther thought it was an epistle of straw and not worth much. The key verse in James is:

Show me your faith without the works, And I will show you my faith by my works.
